The Central Christian University of South Carolina is an open enrollment institution. Admission to Central Christian University of S.C., Inc. requires: (1) that one must be born again, (2) a will to learn, (3) possess/present a high school diploma/G.E.D. with appropriate transcripts, (4) submit an application form completed and signed, (5) submit a letter of reference from a pastor or peer in ministry, and (6) submit a recent photograph and ID for identification purposes.

We educate adult learners who will attend our campus on a part time basis because most of them are full time employees or retirees desiring to obtain a Christian degree. 100% of our students pay out of pocket and are on a tuition plan. We offer the Solomon Jackson slash crown Eichelberger scholarship that our students can apply as a candidate to receive scholarship funding. Our students are predominantly nontraditional students. Most of our students are over the age of 45 and take 1/2-time college semester load of credit hours.

According to National Center for education statistics U S Department of Education retention rates measure the percentage of first-time undergraduate students who return to the same institution the following fall. According to New Lane University retention rate to calculate the retention rate we look at the total number of enrolled students minus the number of students who have withdrawn or cancelled their enrollment and divided this by the total number of enrolled students. The four-year average retention rate at The Central Christian University of South Carolina is 90%.

The retention rate for 2022-2023 increased to 100% as demonstrated in the chart below.

Graduation Completion Rates

The Central Cristian University of South Carolina's graduation rates have received no negative impact as a result of our open enrollment policy. Like many other institutions of Biblical Higher Education, our students are predominantly part-timers. As such, our students do graduate within 150% timeframe required by IPEDS. According to the National Center of Educational Statistics, Graduation rates measure the percentage of first time full-time undergraduate students who complete their program at the same institution within a specified period of time. According to undefined college graduation rates is the percentage of students who graduate from an educational institution the general formula for graduation rate is the number of students graduating divided by the number of students. Graduation rates are important because it shows how committed schools are to graduating their students. As The Central Christian University of South Carolina is totally committed to enrolling, retaining and graduating our students, the measurement used for calculating or graduation rates is based on the number of students who are eligible for graduation.


Based on the number of students who are eligible to graduate from The Central Christian University of South Carolina each year, our four-year average graduation rate is 100%. When graduation rates are measured based on IPEDS measurement instructions, the four-year average graduation rate is 24%. When combining both methods, our four-year average graduation rates are 62%.

The administration believes that it should evaluate its criteria for retention in view of the large difference between the institution's retention and IPEDS retention.



2022 Association for Biblical Higher Education Bible Knowledge Exam Results


To assess learning outcomes The Central Christian University of South Carolina administers the Association for Biblical Higher Education Bible Knowledge Exam to all students. 2022 is the first year we administered the exam to our students. Our goal is for student's exam scores to increase by 10% from the pre-test given the first semester upon enrollment and the post-test given the semester of graduation. Below are the 2022 assessment analytics.




Charted above is an ABHE comparison rating exam scores of students attending The Central Christian University of South Carolina compared to all ABHE institutions. Our student's performances in the categories of the Pauline Epistles, the Prophets, and Psalms/Wisdom are equal to or exceed that of other ABHE institutions. Our students performed in the ranking of 10% or less than other ABHE institutions in the areas of Acts, Bible as a whole, General Epistles, and Revelation. Our students' weakest areas demonstrating need for improvement are Gospels, Historical Books, and Pentateuch.



When rates performance by Biblical teaching our students were equaled or exceeded all ABHE institutions in the areas of Bible general knowledge, Bible Genre, Christology, and Old Testament Vocabulary. Our student performed with in a 10% less than range of all ABHE institutions in the areas of New Testament general knowledge, and Soteriology. In this category our students demonstrated the greatest need for improvement in the areas of Covenant, Eschatology, New Testament vocabulary, Old Testament general knowledge, Revelation, and Theology.



The freshman cohort was the first and only cohort to take the ABHE Bible Knowledge Exam. The above results from the 2022 Fall Semester revealed that our students' scores ranged from 41% to 61%. The three areas with scores in the 40-percentile range are General Epistles, Historical books, Prophets, and Psalms/wisdom. All other categories, our students scored above the fifty-percentile range.



In the category of performance by teaching by class, our freshman class scored between 41% and 69%. Our strongest areas were Bible general knowledge, Eschatology, Old Testament vocabulary, and Soteriology. Our mid-range scores were Bible Genre, Christology, New Testament general knowledge, and Theology. The area our students demonstrated the greatest need for improvement are Covenant, New Testament Vocabulary, Old Testament general knowledge and Revelation.

The ABHE Bible Exam is to be administered to all ABHE institutions. As demonstrated in charts above, text scores from our institution are compared to other ABHE accredited institutions. This exam is a direct measurement in determining The Central Christian University's ability to fulfill our mission to equip and empower our students to do the work of the ministry by providing biblical education while promoting spiritual growth and maturity. Scores from this current year will serve as our in-house benchmark when compared to future year's scores. Our scores when compared to other ABHE institutions will demonstrate our compatibility and comparability to other institutions enhancing the viability of our institution.

Poste-graduation occurrences are measured by employment rates, volunteer Christian services, or enrollment in graduate programs (continued education). In fulfilling our mission, we equip, empower, educate, and train our students. As such, upon graduation, our students either obtain gainful employment, serve as volunteers in Cristian service, or continue with their educational aspirations.



Table #7--Student Satisfaction


The charts below are a reflection of educational outcomes experienced by students of The Central Christin University of South Carolina. The Student Satisfaction Survey outcomes reflected in Table #5 were administered via Cognito Forms. Data was exported and analyzed using the Numbers Spreadsheet Application, an Apple Mac product.



On a likert Scale from Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagee, students were asked to rate their Course/Class Expectations..

- Course expectations were well defined.
- A syllabus with clarity was distributed.
- Course used appropriate instructional materials.
- Assignments, papers, and exams were clearly explained.
- Grading for assignments were fair and equitable.
- Courses were offered to fit my schedule.

Analysis: The outcome of this assessment demonstrated that from 2020 through 2021, there was an obvious decline in the clarity of Course/Class Expectations in each of the six areas surveyed. Observation of this underperformance is due to the sudden pivot from face-to-face learning to online learning as a result of the global pandemic. Additional issues were discovered in the areas of assignments, papers and exams and course scheduling time. Overall, students rated "Agree" in each of the six areas surveyed and listed below. The above results demonstrated that students were satisfied. As of 2022, the institution has noticed a significant improvement in each assessment area.




On a likert Scale from Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagee, students were asked to rate their level of progress in each of the four areas listed below.

- The course/Program challenged me to think critically.
- The course/Program assisted my better understanding of ministry.
- This course/program contributed to better my communication skills.
- This course/ Program strengthened my comprehension and research skills.

Analysis: The overall outcome of students responses ranged from Agree to Strongly Agree; noting they were satisfied and demonstrated positive outcomes in each of the four areas. From 2020-2021, the outcome of this assessment demonstrated that there was an obvious decline of the Progress Learning Outcomes in each of the four areas surveyed. Observation of this decrease in 2021 is due to the impact of the global pandemic and its


effect on students' ability adequately attend to their goals in the program. However, as of 2022, CCU-SC have implemented which has contributed to the significant improvement in each of the four areas assessed.



On a likert Scale from Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagee, students were asked to reflect on Facutly levels of related knowledge-based Experience, by responding to each of the four areas listed below.

- Faculty are qualified academically to teach.
- Faculty are knowledgeable of content.
- Faculty are respectful of students.
- Faculty are available outside of the classroom.

Analysis: The outcome of this assessment demonstrated that from 2020 through 2021, there was a decline in the students' ratings of Faculty Experience. Despite that drop during the pandemic, the overall outcome of students responses ranged from Agree to Strongly Agree; demonstrating they were satisfied with the quality and knowledge-base of the Faculty Experience.



On a likert Scale from Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagee, students were asked to rate the Accessability of Resources based on the three areas listed below.

- The course/program encouraged library use.
- The library operational hours were clear.
- The staff and computers were helpful to my course, research, and success.

Analysis. The outcome of this assessment is evident that from 2020 through 2021, there was a decline in the students' ratings of Resources Accessibility; with a slight decline in 2022. These areas of weaknesses demonstrate opportunities for improvement. The overall outcome of students responses ranged from Agree to Strongly Agree and Neutral.
